

Information Pack for Qualifications for Home Educators aged 14-16

Whilst formal qualifications are not compulsory for children who are home educated, the EHE (Elective Home education) team receive a lot of enquiries about qualifications each year. It is important that all parents/carers are aware that there are options for children to gain qualifications without attending school, which can support their child to access college, post-16 training, or apprenticeships. We hope you find this pack useful.

1. Understanding Your Options for Qualifications

Home educators have several options when considering exams for their children. Here's a breakdown of key qualifications and pathways. Some may not be suitable for home educated children, but they are included so parents are aware of the full range of options:

GCSEs:

- Widely recognized academic qualifications in specific subjects.
- Assessed mainly through exams; some subjects include coursework.
- Typically taken over two years (Years 10 and 11) but can be more flexible for home-educated students.
- Can be taken at any age, and students can choose as many or as few subjects as desired. Some GCSEs include coursework, which may require teacher input.

IGCSEs

- Similar to GCSEs but with less emphasis on coursework, making them suitable for independent learners.
- Focuses on exam-based assessments.
- Can be studied through online courses, correspondence schools, or self-study.

Functional Skills

- Qualifications in English, Maths, and ICT that focus on practical skills and realworld application.
- Available at Levels 1 and 2 (Level 1 is pre-GCSE, and Level 2 is equivalent to a GCSE Grade 4).
- Assessment is pass/fail based on practical tasks.

BTECs and Vocational Qualifications:

- Focus on skills-based learning in various subjects such as Business, Sport, IT, and Health and Social Care.
- Can be taken at different levels (from Level 1 to Level 3).
- Include practical assessments, projects, and coursework.
- Currently more limited for home educators due to the requirement to have regularly assessed assignments.

Open Awards and Other Diplomas:

- Alternative qualifications focusing on skills and knowledge in a variety of fields.
- Includes qualifications like ASDAN, which develop skills for learning, employment, and personal development.
- Currently more limited for home educators due to the requirement to be at a centre (school/college) where they have the certificate to deliver the courses.

T-Levels (Technical Levels):

- Designed as an alternative to A-Levels, but some subjects are available for 14– 16-year-olds.
- These qualifications focus on technical skills with a mix of classroom learning and practical work experience.
- Currently more limited for home educators due to their structured nature.

2. Considerations for Choosing Qualifications

For home-educated students aged 14-16, there are multiple qualification pathways. When selecting qualifications, you may wish to consider the following:

- **Future Goals:** Understand what qualifications are required for further education or career paths.
- **Learning Style:** Choose qualifications that match the student's preferred learning style (exam-heavy, coursework, or practical).
- **Assessment Requirements:** Be aware of the format of assessments—whether exams, coursework, or practical tasks.
- Access to Resources: Ensure you have access to necessary learning materials, exam centres, and any required support (e.g., tutors).
- **Costs:** Account for the costs of courses, exam fees, materials, and any additional support required.
- Flexibility: Some qualifications like IGCSEs and Functional Skills offer flexibility in timing and location of exams, which can be advantageous for home educators.

3. How to Get Started

Step 1: Research and Choose Qualifications

Review the qualifications available and consider which best fit your child's needs and future plans. Use the links provided in this guide and from your own research for specific courses and further information.

Step 2: Plan the Study Approach

Decide whether to enrol in an online school or college, use correspondence courses, or follow a self-study plan. Consider the level of support your child will need.

Step 3: Register for Courses and Exams

For GCSEs and IGCSEs, register with a course provider or purchase study packs, if self-studying.

Ensure registration deadlines are met for exams. This will need to be checked with the exam board and the centre you choose to sit the exam at.

Step 4: Find an Exam Centre

It is the responsibility of the parent/guardian to locate an exam centre where the child can sit as a private candidate. Centres can be found in local schools, colleges, or dedicated private exam centres.

Step 5: Prepare for Exams

Utilize textbooks, online resources, past papers, and revision guides. Plan a study schedule that allows adequate time for each subject.

Step 6: Monitor Progress and Make Adjustments

Regularly review progress and adjust the study plan as needed. Seek additional help if certain subjects prove challenging.

5. Information about each Route to Study:

GCSEs:

GCSEs are delivered by exam boards. These write a syllabus for each exam subject and set and mark the exams. The main ones are:

AQA: AQA | Qualifications

OCR: GCSE qualifications - OCR

Pearson Edexcel: Edexcel GCSEs | Pearson qualifications

WJEC: GCSE & A Level Qualifications | WJEC

It would be worth checking which exam centre offers which subject, and if there are any limitations regarding which exam board.

Once decided, it would be useful to download the syllabus (which states what needs to be learned), and there is also access to past exam papers and mark schemes. These are useful to know how the questions will be written and what level of detail the examiners will be looking for. Some exam boards may also provide teaching resources and extra documents which may help.

Finding an exam centre is critical. It is important to register as soon as possible, and at least 6 months before the exam date. Exam fees also increase the closer to the exam date.

When choosing an Exam Centre you may wish to consider:

- **Availability of Subjects:** Not all centres offer every subject, so confirm the availability of your chosen exams.
- **Deadlines and Fees:** Ensure you understand the registration deadlines and fee structure, as these can vary between centres.
- Accessibility: Consider the location and transport options to the exam centre, especially for exams taken over multiple days.

For the most accurate and current information, it's recommended to contact the centres directly or visit their websites to confirm their offerings for private candidates.

The exam centre will let you know how you get access to the results. Some will allow you to collect them in person, others will email them, some may have a log on facility. The results are the student's results and parents/carers will only be able to collect with written permissions from the student.

iGCSEs:

Online Education/Correspondence Courses:

Options like King's InterHigh, Briteschool, Cambridge Home School, and Oxford Home Schooling offer full curricula leading to IGCSEs or GCSEs. These courses are flexible, but the responsibility to find and pay for exam centres falls to parents.

Functional Skills:

Functional Skills are a practical alternative to GCSEs, focusing on applying English, Maths, and ICT skills in real-life scenarios. These can be taken flexibly, but some exam boards have set assessment windows.

14-16 College Provision:

There are some local colleges that allow children who are home educated to enrol on a part-time course. The college will ask for confirmation that the student is home educated from the EHE team. For the team to confirm that your child is home educated, learning needs to be deemed suitable and an up-to-date learning plan needs to be in place.

Due to the college placement being 2 - 2.5 days a week. There is still a requirement for a plan of learning to be in place for the remaining days. The EHE team are aware that the college will be covering the academic side of her education so the remaining time can include aspects such as study time, and life skills for example.

Courses often combine vocational skills with GCSEs or Functional Skills, with exam costs covered by the college. Options are listed below. For more details, please contact the provided links or contact the relevant colleges directly.

It would be advised that applications for college placements are made early. They can fill up quickly.

Return to School or Flexi-Schooling:

For students nearing 14 years old, returning to school or flexi-schooling (part-time attendance) might be options. Flexi-schooling arrangements must be agreed upon with the school.
