The school nurse enuresis clinic was part of legacy arrangements that existed prior to the commissioning responsibility transferring from the NHS to the Council in 2013. The clinic arrangement was never specified but part of a range of

healthcare options that school nurses offered to support families. The City of Wolverhampton Council tendered school nursing and health visiting services this year into a combined Healthy Child offer. This was not within the specification and enuresis clinic provision provided by school nurses will cease as of 30 November 2017. School nurses will continue to offer continence advice and support and toileting would be part of the school readiness offer along with any other health concerns the family have. Children with underlying medical reasons for this condition will still be able to be referred to community paediatrics and the advance nurse practitioners. This falls under the remit of the CCG.
