# Tackling and Preventing Homelessness

#### Request:

Please will you kindly tell me when your strategy for tackling & preventing homelessness was last reviewed & if a mapping & gapping exercise was carried out at that time & if identified any groups who were excluded in your community?

Our document was reviewed in 2015 and is reviewed annually.

Gaps highlighted in the review included:

- Lack of single female homeless provision
- A need for more suitable and affordable long term accommodation
- Better access to support for households with complex needs

In relation to the excluded groups the BME population of the City is 35.5% however the numbers of BME homelessness presentations is around 22% ( I have attached a copy of the annual monitoring data )

The following report takes into account all applications initiated within 2014-15, included in the overall total are applications where due to unforeseen circumstances no decisions were made at the end of the year. The complete breakdowns of outcomes or pending cases are shown in the results below.


Of the 1384 Homeless Applications taken during the period of 2014-15, the following were determined under the Act:

- 299 (21.60%) were determined to be homeless, in priority need and unintentionally homeless and therefore given statutory duty to be re-housed
- 413 (29.84%) { 128 (9.24%) were determined to be eligible but not homeless or threatened with homelessness 285 (20.59%) Not Homeless
- 232 (16.76%) were found to be eligible, homeless but not in priority need, advice and assistance was given
- 037 (02.67%) were found to be eligible, in priority need but determined to be intentionally homeless




#### All Applications By Age Range 2014-2015



#### All Applications By Gender 2014-2015









# All Former Asylum Seekers Leaving NASS BIA Accommodation 2014-15 (Total 52)


From the 1384 Homeless Applications taken during 2014/15, a total of 52 applications were from former Asylum seekers.

- **029** (02.09%) were determined to be homeless, in priority need and unintentionally homeless and therefore given statutory duty to be re-housed.
- 011 (00.79%) were found to be eligible, homeless but not in priority need, advice and assistance was given
- 004 (00.28%) were determined to be eligible but not homeless or threatened with homelessness.
- 005 (00.36%) New and Current
- 001 (00.07%) Information not produced
- 002 (00.14%) No decision made on application due to loss of contact with applicant


#### All Former Asylum Seeker Applications By Age Range 2014-2015



#### All Former Asylum Seeker Applications By Gender 2014-2015




#### Former Asylum Seekers By Household Type 2014-2015






From the 1384 Homeless Applications taken during 2014/15, a total of 6 applications were from 16 to 17 year olds.




#### All 18 to 24 Applications By Gender 2014-2015



#### All 18 to 24 Applications by Homelessness Reason 2014-2015




#### All 18 to 24 Applications By Ethnicity 2014-2015




# All Mental Health / Learning Difficulty Homeless Applications taken during 2014-15 (Total 29) Please see page 16 for priority need decisions


#### All Mental Health Disabilty Applications By Gender 2014-2015

#### All Mental Health Disabilty Applications By Ethnicity 2014-2015




#### All Violence By Gender 2014-2015








#### **All Priority Need Applications By Gender 2014-2015**



#### All Priority Applications By Age Range 2014-2015


















#### All Mental Health Disabilty Applications In Priority Need By Gender 2014-2015



#### All Mental Health Disability Applications In Priority Need By Age Range 2014-2015




#### All Mental Health Disabilty Applications In Priority Need By Ethnicity 2014-2015






